The opening and closing dates of the contest correspond with the fire season date to raise awareness about the fire-prone period.

Actors involved

Valabre is the organizer of the contest and an insurance company (MACIF) is the co-organiser, financing the prizes. The contest is open to all citizens.

Implementation stage

The contest has been prepared during winter and is open during the fire season (15 June to 15 September). The selection phase will happen during the following month and the winners will be contacted by mid-October.

Specific indications are provided on what is allowed in terms of photo manipulation.

Context

More and more photo contests are organized. Especially during summer holidays, it is a recreational way to raise awareness about forest and associated risks.

The jury is independent. To prevent conflict of interest, employees from Valabre and the insurance

Challenges encountered during implementation and solutions incurred

Priorities identified for successful implementation of the Good Practice

Communication through various channels (internet, social media, various types of events, posters, etc.) and in various environments (schools, city houses, etc.) is very important to reach a large and diverse public.

It will be possible to evaluate the impact only after the contest is over. However, it will be difficult to evaluate precisely the impact of this specific measure among a broad range of activities.
